DECEMBER MEETING:

Our last meeting had a somewhat smaller audience than we have been accustomed to for the Christmas meeting, largely resulting from the inclement weather at that time. As usual there was plenty of festive food on offer and the popular raffle in place of the entrance charge.

However, the audience that greeted our member, Alan Benjamin (Benjy), made up in enthusiasm what it lacked in numbers. He spoke extremely fluently of his early life growing up in Astwood Bank and his time in the police force.

Benjy attended a boarding school, Old Swinford, in Stourbridge, but as he was not academically inclined he decided to join the police force on leaving school. He wrote off for six application forms from different forces, but completed just one, for West Mercia police and was duly invited for interview at Hindlip Hall. He was offered a job and attended the Police College at Ryton on Dunsmore for training. Benjy began his new job at Redditch Police Station, which before the building of the new town had a population of 35,000. The area covered by Redditch extended from the Birmingham border at Maypole as far as Inkberrow. With few police cars most 'bobbies' had to walk or cycle. Among his many humorous reminiscences he called coming across two thieves removing a safe from a building in Redditch, as well as numerous drunks especially at New Year. Walking the beat usually involved finding a shop doorway to escape from the weather to write up the 'beat book'. He transferred to Alcester in the '70s, working under Sergeant Searson, where he recalled the friendly family atmosphere. He later became the Schools Liaison Officer, his best job, and finally retired in 1998. This was a wonderful talk full of local anecdotes and much enjoyed by all.

Hanbury Hall, built by the Vernon family, is just twelve miles away from Alcester and is in the care of the National Trust. The formal gardens were designed by George London in the early eighteenth century, but in 1770 were changed to the more fashionable landscape style.
