**JUNE MEETING:** The speaker at our June meeting was Christine Penney, who spoke to us about “**A Bishop & His Books**”. The title referred to the library at Hartlebury Castle built up by Bishop Richard Hurd during the eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries. Richard Hurd was born in Congreve, Staffordshire in 1720, the son of a farmer. Hurd went to Emmanuel College, Cambridge, taking his BA, MA and becoming a fellow of the college. He was ordained a priest in 1744 and was a prolific author, largely of religious works. In 1749 he formed a long lasting friendship with William Warburton, who later became Bishop of Gloucester, and whose library Hurd purchased after his death. By 1767 he was appointed Archdeacon of Gloucester and in 1774 he became Bishop of Lichfield & Coventry. Two years later he was selected to be tutor to the Prince of Wales and the Duke of York. In 1781 he became Bishop of Worcester and moved to Hartlebury Castle, seat of Bishops of Worcester, where he built up a magnificent library. As well as acquiring Warburton’s library he also purchased the books of the poet, Alexander Pope, and the postal reformer and entrepreneur, Ralph Allen, both friends of Warburton. Many of his books are annotated in his own hand with comments on the texts, not always complimentary! Books include *Flora Londiniensis* (1798) with hand coloured plates of wild flowers and an edition of 1611 of Edmund Spenser’s work annotated by Pope. This amazing collection of books is one of the few eighteenth century working libraries which is still complete, containing 5,000 volumes dating from 1476 until Hurd’s death in 1808. Not only are the books amazing, but so is the library in which it is housed. Christine encouraged us all to visit Hartlebury to enjoy the castle and Bishop Hurd’s library. Although our audience was not as large as we usually get, probably a result of the fine weather and summer holidays, it was much enjoyed by all those present.

Once again the Society took part in Alcester’s Street Market with a stall, staffed by five members, selling Local Past and our various other publications. We were able to introduce many passers-by to the Society, as well as meeting many of our members, who took advantage of the sunshine to take in the delights of Street Market.
